Seek Good and Not Evil

A reflection on Amos 5:6-7,10-15 by Rev. Annie Ladnier

Seek the Lord and live, or he will break out against the house of Joseph like fire, and it will devour Bethel, with no one to quench it. Ah, you that turn justice to wormwood, and bring righteousness to the ground!

They hate the one who reproves in the gate, and they abhor the one who speaks the truth. Therefore because you trample on the poor and take from them levies of grain, you have built houses of hewn stone, but you shall not live in them; you have planted pleasant vineyards, but you shall not drink their wine. For I know how many are your transgressions, and how great are your sins- you who afflict the righteous, who take a bribe, and push aside the needy in the gate. Therefore the prudent will keep silent in such a time; for it is an evil time. Seek good and not evil, that you may live; and so the Lord, the God of hosts, will be with you, just as you have said. Hate evil and love good, and establish justice in the gate; it may be that the Lord, the God of hosts, will be gracious to the remnant of Joseph.

Amos' words come to us from about 760 B.C.E, when Jeroboam II was the King of Israel. During this time, the people of Israel were divided into two kingdoms. The northern kingdom was known as Israel (also poetically as Ephraim, Isaac, and Jacob). The southern kingdom was known as Judah (also as Zion poetically). Amos was a prophet from Tekoa, a town in the southern kingdom of Judah. He was not a professional prophet or a member of a prophetic guild, but a farmer. God called him and sent him north to prophesy in what to him would have been the foreign country of Israel.

This was a time of general peace and prosperity for Israel, under no real threat from larger nearby empires. But, they were a wealthy society, and Amos was called by God to speak the truth that their prosperity and wealth was built on the backs of the poor. He speaks out against their greed, injustice, brutality, and oppression of the poor. He sees their injustice as a direct rejection of the Lord and the Lord's laws. He challenges the rote worship life of the Israelites and their blatant practice of injustice. **He calls out the truth that one cannot fully worship the Lord and then lead a life of injustice**. He does this, knowing people will not like to hear this message ("they hate the one who reproves in the gate, and abhore the one who speaks truth"). But he brings to the ancient people, and to us, an important reminder that the God we worship, the same God who sent Jesus Christ, is a God who certainly loves us...and loves us enough to be angry when we create injustice for one another. God *does get angry when God's people cause one another to suffer. This anger can come as judgment, but it is a judgment aimed at turning our stone-cold hearts back toward God and one another.*

As Lutherans we are quick to lean into God's grace and often far too quick to throw out the Old Testament or any sign of God's judgment, wrath, or emphasis on law, in light of it. But that is not a faithful rendering of our Lutheran theology. Yes, grace leads the way, but it leads the way away from sin and injustice, creates in us a desire to turn from our hurtful behaviors, and empowers us to serve one another in love. Grace, or Gospel) lives in a symbiotic relationship with the Law. We are Law and Gospel people. We are simultaneously saint and sinner. We celebrate the "already and not yet" of the coming of God's Kingdom. As such, we confess where we still fall short of God's good law and we lean into God's grace so that we can live and love, better.

Next Monday is Indigenous Peoples' Day, and many congregations will recognize this through litanies or prayers this coming Sunday. Over the last year we have been faithfully exploring the ELCA's official Repudiation of the Doctrine of Discovery, a doctrine which gave conquest and colonization of indigenous peoples a religious justification. Our exploration has helped us better understand the ways that Christian Colonization has historically created devastating blows to our indigenous siblings, a beloved section of God's created people. Together we have learned more through books, research, and holy conversations. We are intentionally considering our own Land Acknowledgement as an exercise in "hating evil and loving good and establishing justice in the gate." This is an act of repentance, as not to cheapen God's good grace.

Indeed we are a people who exuberantly celebrate the rich gift that is God's good grace given in and through Jesus Christ. Part of how we honor that grace is to continue to "seek good and not evil," by confessing, seeking forgiveness, and establishing new patterns of behavior that help us live in unity with one another. There is nothing to be ashamed about in doing so! It is the faithful work of God's people!

Last November, Rev. Sara Bishop, NWSWI Synod Advocate for Right Relationship, joined us for an Indigenous People's service and learning opportunity on a synod resolution for Land Acknowledgements. Since then we have been studying and learning more from our indigenous siblings. We have read and discussed *An Indigenous People's History of the United States, have learned more about the Doctrine of Discovery and the ELCA's repudiation of it, and broadened our conversation to wider civic life and faith concerns as we explore how our past informs our present. All of these efforts are in line with the ELCA's wider work, "The Truth and Healing Movement," which serves to put legs onto our official repudiation statement.*



Journey House






WEDNESDAYS 5:45-7:15! Fall Session: September 18th-November 20th

Continuing the Work of the Assistance & Resource Center (ARC) A joint statement from Our Neighbors' Place and Operation HELP

With the discontinuation of the Assistance & Resource Center, Inc. (ARC) this year, Our Neighbors' Place and Operation HELP are developing a partnership to continue ARC's work of "providing short term financial assistance to residents of River Falls and adjacent communities to help them meet their basic needs." By adjusting service areas and leveraging the existing experience and programs of Our Neighbors' Place and Operation HELP, the two partner organizations will continue ARC's tradition of offering:

- Housing Assistance Rent matching, pay arrangements, mortgage payments
- Utilities Budgeting Sessions, payments to utility providers
- Transportation Repairs, gas cards, taxi vouchers, registration, license fees, etc.
- Miscellaneous Laundry, haircuts, work clothing, phone, vital records
- Food School meal assistance, formula, other supplementation
- Referrals Referrals & assistance for other programs

Operation HELP has been providing emergency financial assistance throughout St. Croix County, including the city of River Falls, for more than 30 years. These services include payment assistance for rent, utilities, and major car repairs. In recent years, a temporary emergency housing program (motel vouchers) has been added. Moving forward, these services will be extended to the entire River Falls School District area and adjacent communities will be added as the need and funding support is demonstrated. Applications for emergency financial services are handled entirely online (https://operationhelpstcroix.org/client-application) or by phone allowing clients to apply anytime from any location. Operation HELP has a full-time staff person dedicated to vetting emergency financial applications and working with clients, landlords, utilities companies, and repair shops to work out payment arrangements.

Our Neighbors' Place has spent the past 15 years providing help and hope to anyone in Pierce and St Croix county who is struggling to meet their basic needs. Services are delivered through 4 distinct programs: Day Center, Closet Thrift Store, Backpack Program, and Transitional Housing. Through the Our Neighbors' Place Day Center, guests in the River Falls and Ellsworth School Districts will have access to the Helping Hands Fund. This fund can provide emergency financial assistance related to vehicle costs, vital records, laundry, work clothing, and more - with a focus on priorities that support housing security. Additionally, all guests are eligible for gas cards, taxi vouchers, motel vouchers, food, showers, laundry, phone, and side by side assistance from our full time case manager. Guests who call or visit the Day Center for help will find a safe, nonjudgmental environment where all are welcome.

Although Our Neighbors' Place and Operation HELP are experienced and well-equipped operationally to respond to the discontinuation of services resulting from ARC's departure, funding for these services will be a challenge. In 2023, ARC provided approximately \$125,000 in rent and utility payments assistance to clients and approximately \$50,000 in transportation and other assistance. The continuing generosity of River Falls and Pierce County churches, businesses, clubs and organizations, and individuals will be critical to sustain these resources for local residents who are experiencing financial hardship.
