## "But Pastor Annie, Can We Celebrate Halloween??" A Theological Reflection

The best questions come from confirmation students and this one was no different. Recently shamed by their Christian peer at school for "participating in the Devil's holiday" this young saint wanted reassurance that they were not, in fact, in cahoots with Satan himself.

Of course I've also heard similar inclinations from Christian adults. Some even share dismay that we as a church would dare don our trunks in festive decorations and sport costumes to entertain the children in our midst while passing out generous portions of treats...instead of...I suppose kneeling at our altars and praying fervently for the safety and protection of our children, or doing something else....more holy?

My facetiousness aside, reality is that what we commonly know as "Halloween" is actually rooted in Christian tradition! As you may know we are about to celebrate All Saints Sunday this coming weekend. Actual "All Saints Day" is Friday, November 1. October 31 is "All Hallow's Eve" or "All Saints Eve." This was a carnival-like inversion celebrating the shadow side of life — ghosts and ghouls and such — just before the great festival celebrating the saints. It was a mockery of death in light of Christ's Resurrection! Katherine May, in her book, "Wintering," writes that Halloween celebrates an "overturning of the natural order and has its lineage in old traditions of reversing the roles: having the poor become rulers and bringing the rich low." You may recall Mary's Magnificat at the announcement of the coming of Jesus:

He has brought down the powerful from their thrones

and lifted up the lowly;

he has filled the hungry with good things

and sent the rich away empty.

Halloween then is an emboldened act of those without power to mock those who think they are charge, because it is indeed Christ who has robbed the powerful of their most evil threat- the very threat of death! These festivals were often tolerated because there has always been a feverish link between monsters and mockery where those without power have often been given permission to play on the edges of civility in order for the powerful to quell their possible more dangerous lurches toward actual riot and rebellion.

Interesting, eh?

Now, some of its pagan roots may well include folk traditions of honoring the dead, appeasing evil spirits, and marking the end of the summer harvest and the beginning (in the Northern hemisphere, at least!) of the darkest days of the year. There are strong echoes of the Gaelic pagan festival of Sauin, which too, marked the arrival of the dark half of the year with bonfires and the scattering of ashes, and was when many believed the veil between the two worlds of the living and the dead was at its thinnest. This is often when Gaelic fairies were thought to be at the peak of their mischief. It was a celebration of limbo. It spoke to our desire not to be forgotten when we die or to be forgotten by those who die.

As Christianity evolved and usurped some of these pagan traditions, this festival was given new meaning and became a complete mockery of death or its supposed hold on us. Today our decorating of our homes and trunks, and very bodies in costumes is a special act of Christian rebellion against death! Or as our baptismal liturgy calls for, this act is an embodiment of our public renunciation of "the devil and all the forces that defy God!"

I also dare say that in our current climate, where plenty of neighbors are turning against neighbors over any variety of ideologies or opinions, the act of opening our doors wide, greeting neighbors with generous gifts of hospitality, welcoming every person, monster, goblin, or character that crosses our doorstep is darn near sacramental- as in a means of grace. Now, don't go telling on me to the bishops here, I am well aware Christ's Holy Table and Font are exquisitely purposed for that- but I do think that we and our neighbors are hungry for gifts of welcome and sharing and joy together in these days, all of which are Christlike. These next couple of days are a holy invitation into that kind of being in our world and I say we unabashedly delve into it with arms full of candy and grace for our neighbors!

Nanny-nanny-doo-doo to the devil, death, and all the powers of this world who so blatantly try to rebel against God and draw us away from Christ's divine love. (Insert raspberry blowing face here). Pastor Annie Ladnier

#### The Ministry of HOPE's Council: Naming Our Values

The HOPE Ministry Council has been faithfully exploring HOPE's values over the last six months. This has been diligent, engaging, and meaningful work and we are excited to share what the Holy Spirit has helped us discover! Our work was rooted in our current mission statement:

HOPE is called by God to look beyond ourselves.
We walk together in faith, treasuring all people and sharing with them
the love, hope and acceptance that is in Christ.

We agreed that this mission has served us well and continues to be the centerpiece of who God calls us to be in and through this community of faith. But we also acknowledged that it left some ambiguity on how best to live into that statement moving into the future. Over the last few years, including during the pandemic, we noticed that some of our decision making had become increasingly difficult and many of our ministry teams expressed feeling disconnected from one another. Understanding that it is the council's primary role to make sure that HOPE has a vision and all teams are moving in the same direction toward that vision, naming our values has been a central focus for the 2024 HOPE council as we prepare for our next phase of ministry together!

In fact, HOPE will celebrate our 20th anniversary in 2026! As we continue to identify our goals and hopes for the next generation of our ministry, it is our hope that these values can inform just how we live into our mission in the coming years. Utilizing the feedback we received from our Cottage Meetings, especially the values that were named during that process, our council distilled down the long list of values into our top four. This required scripture-centered, thoughtful, and at times, passionate, conversation. While we will massage out the final details during the November council meeting, we would love to share the four main values:

- Serving generously
- Spiritual Nourishment
- Our connection with creation

The Biblical Art of Sadao Watanabe



#### **ELCA Truth & Healing Movement Opportunities!**





# Continuing the Work of the Assistance & Resource Center (ARC) A joint statement from Our Neighbors' Place and Operation HELP

With the discontinuation of the Assistance & Resource Center, Inc. (ARC) this year, Our Neighbors' Place and Operation HELP are developing a partnership to continue ARC's work of "providing short term financial assistance to residents of River Falls and adjacent communities to help them meet their basic needs." By adjusting service areas and leveraging the existing experience and programs of Our Neighbors' Place and Operation HELP, the two partner organizations will continue ARC's tradition of offering:

- Housing Assistance Rent matching, pay arrangements, mortgage payments
- Utilities Budgeting Sessions, payments to utility providers
- Transportation Repairs, gas cards, taxi vouchers, registration, license fees, etc.
- Miscellaneous Laundry, haircuts, work clothing, phone, vital records
- Food School meal assistance, formula, other supplementation
- Referrals Referrals & assistance for other programs

Operation HELP has been providing emergency financial assistance throughout St. Croix County, including the city of River Falls, for more than 30 years. These services include payment assistance for rent, utilities, and major car repairs. In recent years, a temporary emergency housing program (motel vouchers) has been added. Moving forward, these services will be extended to the entire River Falls School District area and adjacent communities will be added as the need and funding support is demonstrated. Applications for emergency financial services are handled entirely online (https://operationhelpstcroix.org/client-application) or by phone allowing clients to apply anytime from any location. Operation HELP has a full-time staff person dedicated to vetting emergency financial applications and working with clients, landlords, utilities companies, and repair shops to work out payment arrangements.

Our Neighbors' Place has spent the past 15 years providing help and hope to anyone in Pierce and St Croix county who is struggling to meet their basic needs. Services are delivered through 4 distinct programs: Day Center, Closet Thrift Store, Backpack Program, and Transitional Housing. Through the Our Neighbors' Place Day Center, guests in the River Falls and Ellsworth School Districts will have access to the Helping Hands Fund. This fund can provide emergency financial assistance related to vehicle costs, vital records, laundry, work clothing, and more - with a focus on priorities that support housing security. Additionally, all guests are eligible for gas cards, taxi vouchers, motel vouchers, food, showers, laundry, phone, and side by side assistance from our full time case manager. Guests who call or visit the Day Center for help will find a safe, nonjudgmental environment where all are welcome.

Although Our Neighbors' Place and Operation HELP are experienced and well-equipped operationally to respond to the discontinuation of services resulting from ARC's departure, funding for these services will be a challenge. In 2023, ARC provided approximately \$125,000 in rent and utility payments assistance to clients and approximately \$50,000 in transportation and other assistance. The continuing generosity of River Falls and Pierce County churches, businesses, clubs and organizations, and individuals will be critical to sustain these resources for local residents who are experiencing financial hardship.
